Dear Friends:

I am excited to bring you an update on what has been happening with the programme in Christian Religious Studies at the University of the Gambia.

What Happened During the Past School Year (October 2020 to June 2021)?

The fall semester saw all university classes being held online. Some professors went the extra mile to meet with students unable to afford expensive internet data plans.

The present semester included resumption of in-class learning due to a drop in COVID cases last fall. The semester is still underway, ending late June/early July.

I am teaching three classes as usual, New Testament II (everything except for the Gospels), Communicating the Bible, and Theology II: The Work of God (mostly...through Jesus Christ)...

Things are fairly normal here, which is surprising. . . since the tourist industry is like aghost town. Traffic is worse than ever. Grocery stores are having a hard time getting things from outside the country . . . Food prices are going up. Most places (except our church where several doctors attend) only a few people wear masks. The traffic is worse than ever . . . with a lot of construction going on

Please continue to pray for the faculty—Drs Lane Turner, Manhee Yoon, and Tanimu Saminaka; and Bannie Manga and Shaka Ashcroft. Pray also *for our liaison Pastor Benjamin Michael, whose work at recruitment and PR is crucial and whose wife will soon lose her good job* to a Gambian national (originally Nigerian, her naturalization process has been prolonged for years!). Kindly pray also for our many students.

The Second Graduation for Students in Christian Studies

Earlier this year—February 27th—seven students of Christian Religious Studies celebrated the completion of their four years of study. This is now *the second class of graduates with a Bachelor's degree in Christian Studies*. It brought back fond memories of my visit at the same time 15 months ago, just prior to the outbreak of COVID-19.

Graduation ceremonies were held outdoors, but family members were not allowed to attend. Some family members joined the graduates at a restaurant where students shared their experience, which included a consistent theme of appreciation for the Canadian sponsors. *Your prayers and financial support are not going unnoticed!*

Student Expresses Gratitude

Drs Wendy and Adrian Helleman (retired Canadian missionaries who have also been working on this project) recently wrote:

It is now increasingly clear that the programme is making a significant impact on the country. By this year, some twenty students have graduated—capable men and

women well equipped for Christian ministry in a country where less than 5% of the population is Christian. Of the seven graduates this year, three are teachers, three are pastors and one is involved in youth ministry.

The Gambia and Covid-19

Although the country saw a big spike between July and September of last year, numbers were low enough in the fall to allow for a re-opening of the school for the 2021 new year. A modest second wave between February and April saw daily cases rise to between 25 and 70, but since then they have gone down to the point where now daily *recorded* cases 2–5 people. Vaccines (Astra Zeneca) first became available in March, but many are hesitant to take it.

Thank God, the impact of Covid has been modest. It could have been devastating!

How Are We Doing Financially?

The University recently billed us for the present school year which ends in June. We offered 32 full scholarships (i.e., tuition payment for both semesters) and 4 half scholarships (because of second-term admissions and a scholarship that was taken away from one underperformer). And: good news!! *Thanks to your continued commitment, we can pay the bill of just over \$34,000*. As I like to admit, that's a lot of money; but it was well spent on 34 years of university-level Christian training for a country in great need of Christianity. Thank you!!

Are Students Earning Their Keep?

If you're like me, you'll be concerned that no student takes these scholarships for granted. Please be assured that we promptly remove scholarship support for any student who performs unsatisfactorily. Excepting extreme situations that are understandable, our policy is to take a scholarship away from any student whose average grade drops below the faculty standard. If during the following semester (which they must pay for themselves) their grades return above the threshold, scholarships are reinstated.

Fortunately, we've had to do this only a few times in the past six years, as most students are keen. In fact, two of this year's grads won awards for their high grades—unlike others of us who might have graduated *lordy how cum*? ©
